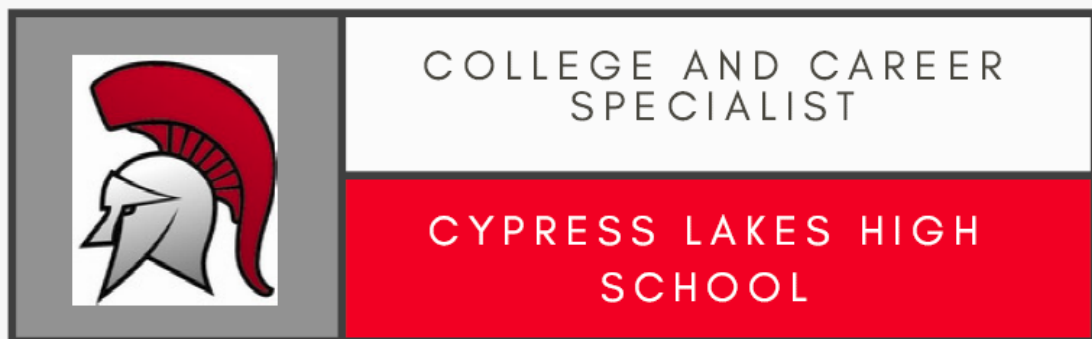
<p>Letters of Recommendation Process</p>	<p>1. Complete the Cy-Lakes brag sheet. Download and complete the brag sheet then email the brag sheet to your counselor.</p> <p>2. Ask your recommender; provide the recommender with email address or the physical address to the university requesting the recommendation. Recommender will send the letter to the college.</p> <p>3. Allow 2 weeks for the recommender to complete the letter. Send thank you note to recommender.</p> <p>Cy-Lakes counseling team email addresses</p>

<p>Scholarships Scholarship season opens October and runs through April</p>	<p>Be aware of the scholarship application process and deadlines for each scholarship. Spartan Senior Timeline

JULY/AUGUST

- Have your Senior yearbook pictures taken.
- Start online college applications!
- Finalize college application essays –PROOFREAD, PROOFREAD, AND PROOFREAD!

SEPTEMBER

- Check the College & Career Center website and Class of 2023 Schoology group often for information.
- Make a calendar of application & financial aid deadlines, test dates, etc.
- Prepare to submit your college application (Don't meet deadlines, BEAT deadlines!).
- If required by colleges, request letters of recommendation. Allow for a 2/3 week turnaround AFTER you talk to your recommender.
- Register for SAT and/or ACT, if required.
- Gather data needed for the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid); apply for PIN number on www.fafsa.gov
- Register & pay for AP Exams in November.

OCTOBER

Don't Trick-or-Treat until You're Complete!

- FAFSA opens on October 1st and should be completed as soon as possible!
- Senior conferences with counselors.
- Participate in CFISD College Night.
- Take the SAT or ACT, if needed.
- Submit your college applications and all required information/documents BEFORE the deadline.
- Seek and apply for scholarships.

NOVEMBER

- Take the SAT or ACT if necessary.
- CFISD Funding your Future (Financial Aid Night)

DECEMBER

- Check your emails & online college accounts DAILY and follow-up on any missing info. Watch your admissions file status!

JANUARY

- Continue to monitor applications online.
- Continue to seek and apply for scholarships from a variety of sources.

FEBRUARY

- Complete mid-year report and order an updated transcript, if required by your college(s).
- Continue to seek and apply for scholarships from a variety of sources.

MARCH

- Watch your email for decision letters and financial aid award letters; compare financial aid packages.
- Get vaccinated and upload to your student account
- Texas law requires the bacterial meningitis vaccine (or waiver) in order for a student to register for college classes.

APRIL

- Finalize college housing arrangements.

MAY GRADUATION:

- Inform your college of your acceptance of their offer of admission & financial aid by May 1st
- Take AP exams (May, 2022)
- Write thank you notes to the people who wrote letters of recommendation for you.
- RSVP for your college's summer orientation session
- Request a copy of your final transcript to be sent to the school you choose to attend. Every college requires a final transcript to be sent AFTER graduation.
- Complete Senior Surveys.

JUNE/JULY/AUGUST

- Take part in summer orientation programs for incoming freshmen, meet with an academic advisor & register for classes.

FAQ's about College Application process:

When should I start?

July and August of senior year is the best time to start. [Timeline](#)

How do I begin?

Find out [what goes into an application](#) and begin collecting the materials you need. Create a folder for each college you are applying to. At the front of each folder, put a [checklist](#) of what you'll need for the application and when it's due.

How many colleges should I apply to?

To increase your chances of getting in to a selective school, and to account for colleges you may not have considered before, we recommend a balanced list. A balanced list includes at least 3 *reach* colleges, 2 *matches*, and 1 *safety* school. They should all be colleges you'd be happy to attend.

What are reach, match, and safety schools?

Think about narrowing your colleges into three categories:

Reach Schools: Reach schools are colleges where your academic qualifications are below the average accepted student. When considering a reach school, it's still important to be realistic. It's quite unlikely you would gain entry to an Ivy League university with a 2.0 GPA. However, even if your SATs might be 100 points lower than average or you have a 5.4 GPA instead of a 5.8, if you really like the school, throw your hat into the ring. You never know what will happen. It could be a long shot but an admissions officer might just see your potential.

Match Schools: A match school is one in which your transcript mirrors that of the average freshman on that campus. Therefore, your GPA, SAT/ACT scores and coursework are all on par with those undergrads typically admitted. While this will not guarantee an acceptance (especially considering that extracurricular activities, essays, etc. will come into play), you can apply with confidence and the understanding that you have a great shot.

Safety Schools: As you've probably deduced by now, a safety school is one in which your academic credentials exceed those of the average accepted student. Consequently, there is a high probability that you will be admitted.

What are the Coalition, Common, and Apply Texas Applications?

These are examples of college application services that provide standardized applications which allow you to apply to multiple schools with a single application. Instead of filling out eight different applications, you can simply fill out one and submit it to each college.

The [Coalition Application](#) is accepted by more than 90 institutions. The platform includes "The Locker," a private space for you to collect and organize materials throughout high school that you might want to share with colleges and universities.

The [Common Application](#) is a standardized application used by nearly 700 colleges.

[Apply Texas Application](#) is a standardized application used by public colleges in state of Texas.

Be aware that you may need to submit additional or separate documents to some colleges. You also still need to pay individual application fees for each college.

Letter of Recommendation: Does your college require a letter of recommendation? If you need to find that out, see the university's Freshman Admission page. Complete the Cy Lakes brag sheet and email it to your counselor. Next, ask recommender if they are willing to write a letter on your behalf and make sure you provide recommender 2-3 weeks to complete the letter. Then, provide the

recommender with the link or physical address (if mailed provide envelope and stamp) to the university. Write a thank you note to the recommender.

How do I send a Transcript? High school transcripts can be requested in person at the Cy-Lakes Registrar Office or online at [CFISD](#).

Lone Star College Transcript for Dual Credit students can be requested in the students Lone Star College account. Under the student tab click Academic Record.

How do I know how many college hours I have? This information is located in your Lone Star College account in the student tab, select Academic Record. Once in Academic Record student can then select to view an unofficial transcript which will list all the college courses taken. Hours can be calculated by looking at the course number. For example, English 1301, the 3 indicates the course is a 3 hour course. Another example is MATH 2413. The 4 indicates the course is a 4 hour course.

If I took Dual Credit classes am I considered First Time Incoming to College (FTIC) or applying as a freshman in college?

You are considered First Time Incoming to College or a freshman

College Visits: All 11th and 12th grade student have 2 college visits each year. Before going on the college visit stop by the Cy-Lakes Attendance Office to pick up the College Day Attendance form. Return the form to the Attendance Office. Virtual college visits [click here](#)

Sending Test scores: Students are responsible for sending all SAT, ACT and AP scores to the universities. Most schools want official test scores and official scores must come from College Board or ACT. Sign in to your account on [College Board](#) and [ACT](#) to send your scores.

How do I use College Application Waivers? To qualify for college application fee waivers students must have either taken an SAT using a test waiver or the student must be eligible to receive free/reduced lunch with completed School Café application. To receive free/reduced status all families must submit an application [online](#) and qualify for the service. If a student used a SAT test waiver, once the score becomes available in the account, then 4 college application waivers are uploaded into the student's College Board account. The student is responsible for filling out waivers and sending the waivers to the universities (mail or upload). Please note the CFISD School Day SAT test was paid for by CFISD. No student received a test waiver for that test administration. [NACAC](#) is another opportunity to receive 4 college application waivers. Click NACAC, print the waiver and complete the top portion then bring the form to your counselor, who will verify free/reduced lunch status. Then either mail or upload the document to the university. *Remember you have to complete payment for each application if payment is required. So if you applied to 4 universities you will need to complete 4 application waivers.*

Should I even bother applying to colleges I don't think I can afford?

Absolutely. Remember that after financial aid packages are determined, most students will pay far less than the "[sticker price](#)" listed on the college website. You don't know if you can afford a college until after you apply and find out how much aid that college will offer you (if you're accepted). Fill out the FAFSA in October.
